## Dear Council Members:

Nine years ago, I worked with the Trees Matter Coalition to get the current Montgomery County Urban Tree Bill and the Street Tree Bill passed by the Council and signed by then County Executive Leggett. While those bills were a good start -- or better than nothing -- they did not do enough to reverse loss of the urban forest. Instead, they are essentially "replanting bills" designed to plant new trees rather than protecting mature tree canopy. The street tree bill has a few more teeth than the urban tree bill but both bills are not what we had hoped for. And sadly, community members had worked for 8 long years to get the 2013 tree bills passed.

What the County urban tree bill and street tree bill cannot cover could perhaps be addressed in part by a stronger no net loss policy added to the existing county Forest Conservation Law. Please do all you can to strengthen this law, then look to tackle improvements to the legislation passed in 2013.
